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# Rural Homoeopathic Hospital, Palghar

The year 2020 -2021 would be remembered for the remarkable work done by MLD Trust during Covid crisis. Our staff, students and doctors resolved to continue with all essential and emergency services when the lockdown was announced despite multiple hurdles and personal risks. Many teams were formed to ensure smooth functioning including infection control measures. We served 71,895 patients from 15<sup>th</sup> March 2020 till 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021. We offered totally free or subsidized services to poor patients to the tune of Rs. 1,28,21,805.

## Covid Unit

RHH was the only Homoeopathic hospital in Maharashtra to get permission to start a dedicated Covid unit so that role of Homoeopathic treatment in Covid infections as an adjunct therapy could be explored. This was possible because of team of allopathic consultants, Homoeopathic PG teachers, medical officers and MD students showing willingness to serve Covid patients.

- We inaugurated the Covid unit on 17th August 2020. We soon inducted various medical equipment like Multipara Monitors, Infusion Pumps, Defibrillator, Video Laryngoscope, X Ray Cassettes, laptops, High Flow nasal oxygen system (HFNC), Liquid Oxygen Bank through support of various donors to create a fully equipped set up.
- Total patients treated: 294    Free: 32    Subsidized: 43
- Services were suspended due to decrease in number of patients in Palghar region on 14<sup>th</sup> January 2021 and restarted on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2021 due to second wave of Covid infections.

## Support to community

- Distributed Arsenic Album Medicine, a homoeoprophylactic medicine advised by the Ministry of AYUSH, GOI, free of cost to more than 2,00,000 families in Palghar, Vikramgad, Wada, Dahanu, Mumbai, Pune, Kolhapur through volunteer & community leader support.
- Distributed 200 Free Masks for patients & relative donated by lions club of Palghar.

## What we learnt

- Service to the poor is service to God: We realized this when we treated Vinod, a young man of 21, living in dire poverty, suffering from end stage renal disease. In the lockdown on 17th April 2020, he walked 12 km to reach our hospital in a state of breathlessness as he had not been able to go to Valsad civil hospital due to lockdown and hence had not received dialysis since 10-12 days. He needed urgent dialysis to save his life. He was immediately admitted and investigated. His hemoglobin was 4 gm% (N=14-16 gm%) and Creatinine was 27 (N = >1mgm%). RHH continued to give him free dialysis with medicines thru donor support.
- Intent to serve and collective will of the team can overcome all obstacles: 3 staff members travelled more than an hour on a motorcycle to reach the hospital. Our 66-year-old matron refused the offer of a double salary and decided to start staying on the campus to guide the

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nursing staff. One staff member was forced to live on the verandha of his house lest he brought in Covid 19 from hospital. Many stayed on campus just in case their services were required leaving their families far away. They shared the feeling that we cannot abandon our patients in this hour of need

- There are many noble souls out there, even in an era of materialism and consumerism: We need to connect to them. This was experienced intensely when a noble soul, Mr. Mani C. Parmeshwar, picked up and dropped our poor dialysis patients from their homes as they had no means of transport. Families of our doctors gave full support to the team who worked. Families shared “donated” their members to the cause of society; not one family fearing loss of death of their loved one!!
- Hospital services during crisis is all about teamwork: Services of everybody - from senior consultant to ward boy matter a lot. To manage dialysis and Sr citizen center is a challenge we took up as we were responsible for 93 people. They were the most vulnerable group. The team ensured all remained healthy. Not a single Covid case was reported for initial 4 months. Thereafter there have been many cases of Covid infection in staff, students and consultants. But all have rejoined immediately at the end of quarantine period. The spirit to serve has not diminished.
- Staff is willing to risk their lives if they know that management cares for them and their families: The staff asked us who will look after our children if we are no more? This intense and direct question touched the right chord. Our community care committee raised funds to offer life insurance of 5 lacs to each employee. The employees got the message that management cares for us. Attendance has been above 90% since then.

We congratulate all the consultants, teachers, medical officers, MD students, hospital staff for their hard work and commitment towards patient care which allowed them to work despite potential risks to life. We are sure that all benefited in the process - the patients, the learners and Homoeopathy. Thanks are due to many donors and well-wishers not only from Palghar-Thane-Mumbai region but from across India and abroad. Without their overwhelming support we would not have been able to sustain our services.

We look back with satisfaction as we remember Master Hahnemann who said ‘I have not lived in vain’.

**Project: Mental Wellbeing of Residents in old age home**

A 9-session series of workshop on Mental well-being aiming to evolve positive mental health in Residents of Old Age Home at Anand Vruddhashram was conducted by Dr. M. L. Dhawale Memorial Trust with sponsorship from Helpage India during Pandemic. Programme was inaugurated on 9th October 2020 in presence of Manager of the Projects in Maharashtra, Mr.Valerian Pais, and Head of Department of Psychiatry, Dr. Manoj Patel, Associate Professor Dr. Sunita Nikumbh, Lecturer Dr. Mansi Surati and Medical Social Worker Mrs Vidya Patil.

Subject experts of various fields like Psychiatrist, psychologist, physiotherapist, Geriatric consultants were involved. Workshops were based on action learning principles and activity based which involved Care Givers as well. At end of each workshop, Action plans were assigned to them keeping Trustee and Care Givers of Ashram in the loop. Workshop modules were crafted by Helpage India and required changes were made in conduct of session as per need of the 22 odd residents of Anand Vrudhashram. # Dr. M.L. Dhawale Memorial Homoeopathic Medico Surgical and Research Centre, Malad



Financial Year 2020 -2021 has been a challenging year across the globe due to Covid pandemic resulting in total lockdown announced from 22 March 2020.

Impact of this on our working was that

1. All the nearby private hospitals and general practitioners were not working,
2. No Transport facilities were available.
3. Tremendous fear in mind of all stakeholders (Patients, Doctors and Staff)
4. No one was ready to see their known patients.
5. New disease and approach to the disease was not clear.
6. Lack of knowledge about PPE and its usage in clinical practice
7. Financial losses to both hospital and patients due to lockdown.
8. Everything became virtual from Personal

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**Malad hospital with whole team worked against all odds and has risen to the occasion to achieve the vision and mission of our trust.**

***“Reaching the unreached and serving the needy” with the help of our dedicated team.***

**A: Covid Deliveries in the Hospital:**

Covid positive pregnant females had visited our hospital in labour and had no facilities for delivery as all nearby centers were closed. We conducted 15 Covid deliveries inspite of being non Covid hospital. There was fear in the mind of staff and doctors but it was overcome with constant emotional support, adequate universal precautions, orientation of all the staff and following all necessary sensitization procedures to ensure safety of all concerned. There was no positive case amongst the health workers of the Hospital .

**B: Guiding and Helping Covid Positive Delivery patients:**

We guided 50 Covid positive patients to get admitted for delivery to BMC centers with our good association with P north ward. Patients were happy and relieved with our gesture of helping when nobody was available to listen to them leave apart examining them. We arranged bed, transportation of patients to municipal/government set up and followed up till their discharge from Covid center.

**C: Started Covid testing facilities:**

In the month of April in collaboration with SRL and in order to serve the patients without profit, we started in house Covid testing RT-PCR sample collection. In the last one year, we have conducted approx. 1000 Covid tests.

**D: Charges remained unchanged:**

Considering the economic impact across the community due to lockdown and loss of employment and inspite of low income due to Covid, we maintained constant charges, being true to our mission of serving the poor and needy. (last revision was done in 2016). PPE kits were charged to patients at actuals without making any profit and made it free for the poor and needy

**E: Financial Support:**

No patient was turned back due to lack of financial capacity.

**F: Introduction of Swasth Card:**

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Considering the above we started a new facility --Swaasth card in the month of September 2020 to help the poor and needy patients in the community. It offered them cash back 10% on our hospital services (OPD/IPD/Investigations/Medicines), loan, and insurance. 600 New Patients were enrolled for the card with approx. 5000 transactions till March 2021

#### **G: Dedication & Care of Employees:**

1. In spite of lockdown, our staff risked their lives and gave importance to duty. There was almost 100% attendance in IPD and 50% attendance in OPD in rotation
2. No staff was discharged in spite of not doing financially well. They were paid for their leaves and no salary was deducted
3. Staff term insurance of 5L Each for taking care of any adversity was implemented.

#### **H. COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES**

##### **I. Celebrated International Women's Day month**

To uplift the mood of the Community /hospital Women's day was arranged through organizing different women centric activities. All activities are listed in Table - community activity

##### **II. Daan utsav Celebration:**

Keeping the Covid pandemic in mind, we celebrated Daan utsav with distribution of Disposable cloth masks. 1000 masks were distributed in the nearby area with awareness of Covid appropriate behavior

##### **III. Distribution of Arsenic Alb Homoeopathic Medicines:**

We distributed 50,000 bottles of arsenic alb in the community free of cost. It was homoeopathic prophylactic medicine for Covid as per guidelines of Ayush Ministry

##### **IV. Project on conflict Management and Performance management:**

In association with TATA pro engage, we conducted successfully 2 projects in the Covid pandemic through digital medium for staff development.

- **Conflict management:**  
This project was designed keeping in mind various issues faced by staff of hospital on day to day basis with patients and their relatives, colleagues, sister, doctors, management (all stake holders) etc. Almost 15 to 20 staff members attended the program. Areas of difficulties were discussed and possible solutions for those problems were brought forward.  
The staff was happy with the project and results were evident. Improved patient care and satisfaction was seen. The programme was extended for next cycle of 6 months.

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- **Performance Management System**

Approx. 30 employees were part of this project. We are exploring having a performance management system in place to motivate the employees. It will boost their willingness to work hard and smart both. The framework is still under process. The project has also been extended for 6 months to get better clarity on the subject.

**V. Cervical Cancer Awareness month:**

Conducted Cervical cancer awareness talk and camp was arranged. Tests were done at 50% cost to our patients as compared to the market prices.

**VI. Camps:**

Various Camps were conducted in the FY 20-21 for the benefit of needy patients in department of Homoeopathy, Dental, Orthopedic. Details are in Table - Community Activity for reference. Camps helped in early detection, diagnosis and better prognosis of the patient outcome. Patients from the camp were given approx. 50% concession in our routine charitable charges. All camps were conducted with strict Covid appropriate behavior in the community and hospital

**VII. Health talks:**

Health talk on various health related topics as per the need of the community were carried out. Details in table Community Activity for reference. Health talks helped in creating awareness about Covid in community

**VIII. Competition:**

Various competitions were held in the community with the sole motto of improving the morale of community people (especially females) which was down due to Covid. This helped us to bring SMILE on their faces.

## Homoeopathic Hospital, Bhopoli

Covid-19 pandemic began in Maharashtra around end of March 2020.

Due to lockdown all the regular activities slowly came to a standstill. Our medical mobile unit could not reach any of the 25 villages as the community blocked off all the entry and exit points from and into the villages due to fear of Covid. Patients could not reach the centre as transport was not available. And as the doctors could not visit the villages, regular health check-ups of pregnant women and malnourished children could not take place.

During this chaotic situation our community health workers and multi-purpose workers went from door to door, explaining the importance of regular intake of medicines by pregnant women and malnourished children. They assured that though doctors would not be able to visit the villages, they themselves will continue visiting individual houses to examine the beneficiaries and hand over the medicines and supplements.

The beneficiaries understood the importance. After explaining this plan of action to the village authorities, they granted permission to the health workers to enter the villages.

### **Activities during this lockdown period (From April 2020 to October 2020):**

- Iron, Calcium and protein powder distribution: 350 pregnant women and 200 lactating mothers
- Homoeopathic medicines: 321 malnourished children
- Haemoglobin check-up continued for ANC women.
- 50 women were diagnosed to be having severe anaemia. They were provided with ambulance facility to come to the center and injection Orofer was administered. This allowed improvement in their haemoglobin level and all these mothers could have a safe institutional delivery.
- Covid prevention program: As per the guidelines of CCRH, Arsenic Album 200 was distributed free of cost to around 1.5 lakh population from Vikramgad, Wada, and Jawahar. People also came to know about homoeopathic prophylaxis through digital media, news channels, etc. Due to this many gram panchayats demanded distribution of Arsenic Album. Thus we could reach out to a large population without much difficulty.
- Due to lockdown, many people suffered huge financial loss. Very poor and destitutes found it very difficult to even have 2 meals a day. Our health workers brought it to our notice. We could distribute grains, oil, pulses, sugar, tea powder and soap to 1350 families in 5 villages, due to support from HLL and EOTO.

## Organic Farming

Focus of work for this year continued on marketing – creation of a sustainable robust market arrangement. Various actions towards this have been listed below.

1. Due to heavy rain fall this year, cultivation started little late in rabi but vegetable supply continued for a longer duration.
2. A person with monthly salary of 9500/-was hired for 3 months for vegetable collection.
3. Compared to last year, the number of varieties in the Rabi season increased to 28 including French beans, Surati papadi, Red radish, lady finger, cucumber. Increase in variety has been an important enabler for accessing markets.
4. Each farmer too has cultivated at least 8 -10 varieties which also serves as a good risk mitigation especially when some vegetables are attacked by pests or do not grow well.

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# PUNE

The shadow of Covid19 loomed large from March 2020. It demanded changes in style of functioning and also the nature of activities.

## LOCKDOWN:

The pandemic had created fear and panic in everyone. Even medical professionals hospitals, general practitioners as well as specialists refrained from treating patients initially. Pimpri centre continued its service with full vigour even in the absence of staff for a month or two single handedly. The patients were given consultation personally and also telephonically. Medicine was couriered for those especially staying away or who were senior citizens. This generated faith in local community about the centre's commitment to service inspite of all odds.

## Covid HELPLINE

We started with Covid helpline to provide telephonic guidance about treatment for patients who are suspected or diagnosed with Covid. This helpline was started with a objective of treating mild to moderate cases of various kinds of fever at home safely with homoeopathy. Get information and help about quarantine/isolation. Care and guidance about severely ill patients. This helpline was active in whole of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> wave. Keeping view in pandemic telephonic and personal consultation was given. Preventive medicines was given to the local community around 2000 individuals. All the medicines were distributed free of cost.

## GERIATRIC CARE PROJECT

On reflecting upon the experience of treating patients during Covid period, it was intensely realised that the overall health condition of senior citizens is a neglected yet very important aspect. Covid situation only worsened it. A need to cater service to them was felt. This formed the foundation of the geriatric care project which was launched on 26th January 2021.

Under this project the senior citizens overall health assessment is done taking into account his medico-psycho- socio- financial condition while providing palliative or curative treatment as well as allied care. The basic goal is helping them to lead a healthy life, as independent as possible, with dignity.

We offer treatment with subsidized rates. Under this project we are treating around 30 patients. A few were given free treatment as they were below poverty line or without any caretaker.

## ICR DHOLE PATIL ROAD CLINIC

Keeping in view with common objective of organization, we distributed preventive medicine to lower socioeconomic people and patients around clinic.

The shadow of Covid loomed large from March 2020. It demanded changes in style of functioning and also the nature of activities. Being a homoeopathic institution committed to community service, we organised a Covid awareness drive along with distribution of PREVENTIVE HOMOEOPATHIC

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MEDICINE Arsenic album 30 in the local community. With the help of housing society committees to BE THE CHANGE we distributed the medicine to 700 individuals.

Also another 500 families( 2000 individuals) were benefited similarly with the help of SAVARKAR MANDAL , a trust which runs a library and many other socio- cultural activities. The whole team of ICR centre actively participated in the task of dispensing and supplying medicine.

#### Covid IPD PROJECT AT DEENANATH MANGESHKAR HOSPITAL ERANDWANE-

We conducted a Research Project on Covid 19 patients which got approved in Deenanath IEC. It is a joint venture between MLDT and Deenanath Mangeshkar Hospital. The topic was - **Efficacy of indicated Homoeopathic medicines as an Adjuvant therapy”**

We studied 100 patients and the findings were as follow-

\*CONCLUSIONS by Statistician\*

**1. Reduction in O2 requirements.**

Yes. O2 requirements are significantly ( $p=0.000$ ) reduced.  
in treatment group among 85.2% patients as compared to placebo patients (5.6%).

**2. Maintaining no oxygen requirement status at Day 4.**

Oxygen requirement on the 4th day was significantly ( $p=0.002$ )  
lower (among 0% patients) as compared to that among placebo patients (46.2%).

**3. Reduced duration of hospitalization.**

Yes. There was significant ( $p=0.002$ ) reduction in the hospital stay among treatment group (6 days) as compared to placebo group(9 days).

**4. Trends towards reduced mortality/ increased survival.**

Although mortality was lower in treatment group (14.8%) as compared to placebo group(22.2%) it couldn't achieve statistical significance.

**5. Reducing need of ICU shifting.**

Yes. There was significant ( $p=0.026$ )reduction in the patients required ICU shifting among treatment group (0%) as compared to placebo group(16.7%).

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The paper was published later in a peer-reviewed Journal - Journal of Integrated Standardized Homoeopathy

Apart from this project we also treated around 400 patients in Deenanath under the same project.

Dr. M.L. Dhawale Trust runs 5 Homoeopathic Charitable Clinics in Mumbai and its suburbs for the lower socioeconomic needy strata of the community since 1984 at Deonar, Jogeshwari. Clinics in Santacruz, Mahul, and Ghansoli are in collaboration with like-minded organisations.

The objective of urban clinical services is to provide quality health services to the needy urban community at charitable rates. This has been possible through our dedicated and sincere team of ICR trained physicians who have been constantly striving to achieve our motto of promising 'Quality assurance in a cost-effective way'.

Due to the outbreak of the Covid pandemic last year, our services at Deonar, Ghansoli and Santacruz clinics have been temporary suspended, as they are in the temple / school campus. The latter were closed almost through the year. The patients were attended online by respective physicians.

Clinical services at Mahul and Jogeshwari have resumed with all precautionary measures like social distancing, sanitization, and compulsory use of mask.

## MAHUL CLINIC-April 2020 – August 2020

The world was hit by Corona Pandemic in March 2020 and the clinic functioning was modified due to the same. As physicians do not reside in the proximity of the clinic and due to the non-availability of public transport, they attended the clinic on alternate days. They also offered video and telephonic consultations for the patients. The compounder dispensed the medicines which were collected by the patients. Appropriate care like social distancing, wearing masks and sanitisation was taken.

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### **Distribution of Ars alb 30 medicine in Mahul on 20 May 2020**

As per the suggestions of the Ministry of AYUSH, GOI, 1150 bottles of Ars alb 30 were distributed to the residents of Mahul and Ambada village, free of cost. Each bottle catered to a family of 5 people for 2 months. These medicines were arranged by Dr. M. L. Dhawale Trust.

This distribution, in Mahul, was carried out by physicians attending the clinic and assisted by Mr Jayesh Koli, member of '*Mahul gaon samiti*', and his volunteers. They prepared a list of all members in each family along with their contact numbers which helped in timely preparation and organised distribution. The distribution was done following all necessary precautions.

Dr Sunil Bhalinge and Dr Madhavi Tamboli (Director and Supervisor of urban clinics of Dr M L D Trust, respectively) guided the physicians in the above process. A meeting was held at the clinic with Mr Jayesh and his volunteers to orient them about Ars alb medicine (when to take, how to take, when to repeat the next dose). This meeting was also attended by Dr Mohini Mhatre (General Practitioner from Mahul *gaon*) and Mr Ramesh Patil (Trustee of *Mahul gaon samiti*).

### **Ars Alb 30 distribution in Ambada on 29 May 2020**

Mr Havesh Katkar from Ambada Gaon took the initiative in Ars Alb distribution here. 500 bottles were distributed in Ambada residents. Each bottle catered to a family of 5 people for 2 months.

As the number of cases started decreasing, and lockdown was released by the government, the clinic started functioning all six days a week from September 2020.

### **JOGESHWARI CLINIC**

The clinic has also started functioning on the daily basis since February 2021, after taking all the necessary precautions.

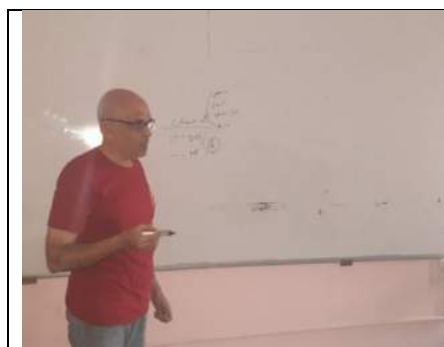

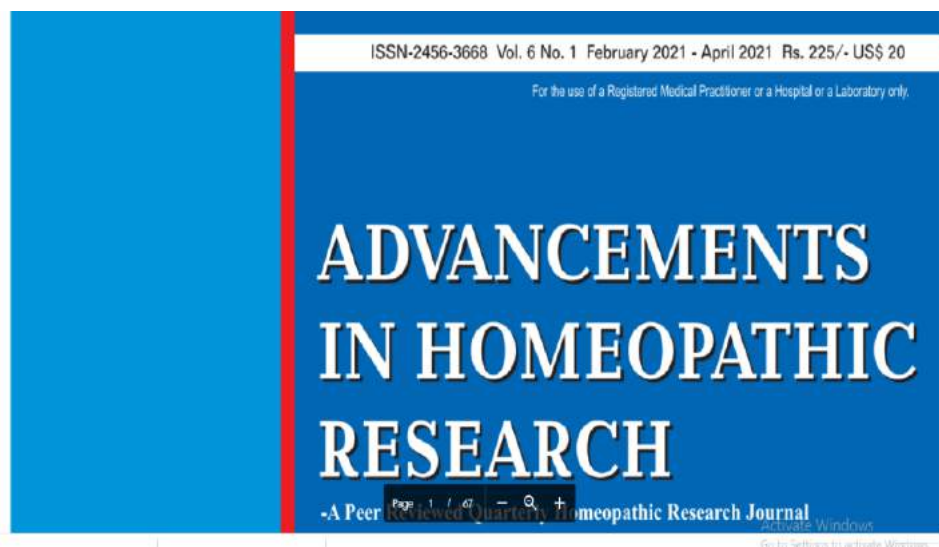

# Appeal for Support

## to Dr. M. L. Dhawale Memorial Trust's COVID 19 Unit at Rural Homoeopathic Hospital, Palghar

COVID 19 continues to prevail in several rural areas, including Palghar. Palghar rural area is adding 150-200 new COVID cases per day out of which 15% need hospitalization for moderate and severe disease.

Since the lockdown, Rural Homoeopathic Hospital was advised by the district authorities to serve non-COVID patients as the number of Covid cases in Palghar were less and treatment of patients on dialysis, ICU, NICU, Sr citizens, orthopaedic and general surgeries was the need of the hour due to shutting down of most private hospitals. Hence, we continued with all our services including Homoeopathic OPD and 100 -bedded IPD serving 17,389 patient visits. Only due to the generous support of our donors, were we able to provide subsidy of Rs 51.52 Lakhs during these trying times.

The District authority has now advised us to start a COVID-19 unit while continuing to offer service to non-covid patients. There is no hospital with a fully functional ICU in Palghar, so necessary for treating severely affected patients. We have thus dedicated 50% of our beds (including the ICU) to exclusively treat COVID affected patients while the remaining 50% will continue to offer essential and emergency services to non-covid patients. In the interest of both, physical barriers have been erected for separate entrance, casualty and ICU to protect non-covid patients and the treating team.

### Our Covid unit is offering:

- A swab collection center
- Special care unit for managing COVID suspect patients
- A well-equipped lab and radiology department for all routine investigations
- Tie up with SRL Phadke Lab, Dadar for specialized investigations like RTPCR, Covid antibody test, inflammatory markers etc.
- Upgraded oxygen supply system to meet increased needs of COVID patients
- A dedicated team of 50 medical & para-medical personnel
- Lodging boarding facility for the staff and doctors to stay on the campus 24x7



Our team in Pune has been working with Deenanath Mangeshkar Hospital, Pune for the last 3 months and has treated more than 250 mild and moderate Covid patients with Homoeopathy as an adjuvant therapy with encouraging results. Now we wish to offer integrated treatment to Covid patients with moderate or severe disease through a team of 3 competent allopathic consultants and 10 Homoeopathic doctors. We are confident that this will result in faster and safer recovery.

We need to offer 25% beds free to poor patients under Mahatma Jyotiba Phule Jan Arogya Yojana and offer services to 55% patients as per Government prescribed rates. 20% special beds will be offered at modest hospital rates. The costs of treating Covid 19 patients are much higher due to higher salaries to be paid to employees for working in a riskier environment, need of PPE kits and other infection control materials & consumables, etc.

We appeal for your support as a majority of our patients come from weaker sections of society and cannot afford the costs. As more funds become available through your support, we shall continue to add more medical equipment, steady supply of PPEs and other infection control materials to improve quality of care of Covid patients and safety of our staff.

## Identifying and managing anxiety disorders in the Adolescent age group

### A community activity of the Department of Psychiatry, MLDMHI

Anxiety disorders bring an unpleasant and unjustifiable sense of apprehension accompanied by somatic expressions. They are one of the most common disorders seen among children and adolescents with prevalence of 4% to 20%. Adolescent age is when numerous transitions take places, such as developmental concerns about future, interpersonal relationships along with academic stress, and biological changes in body in the form of psychosexual development. Observing certain cases presenting with difficulties at a personal, family and social levels in our outpatient department, we decided to undertake this activity in the community. Also the current pandemic situation is known to have taken a major toll of students and affecting their psych and soma in various ways.

So, to address the above issues, the Department of Psychiatry, MLDMHI, approached Dandekar junior and senior college of Palghar, which has the mission to spread higher education in rural and tribal youth to prepare them for advance studies and researches. So the project is an attempt to help the Institution to realize that mission.



#### Objectives:

- To spread awareness about normal expressions of anxiety and its progress to pathology to junior college students
- To identify and study the common and characteristic expressions of anxiety disorders in young adolescent age group
- To study the efficacy of homoeopathic management in cases of anxiety disorders in junior college students

The project kicked off on January 19th 2021. Two resident doctors of the psychiatry department have taken up a research project in the same field made a presentation of anxiety and their common expressions along with their effect on daily life. Students and teachers were very keen to know about all the activities and participated very actively. Some of them approached the presenters to discuss their personal issues and if they could help some of their friends who are at home and have issues related to anxiety. Screening using Hamilton A scale was done of 461 students of the 12th std (Science, Arts and Commerce).

Analysis showed that around 31 students displayed severe anxiety and 60 had moderate level of the problem. This has led us to propose a weekly OPD in their college campus itself. Also as per the request of Vice principal, similar sort of activity is being planned for teachers in campus. Also these activities will allow us to take steps to approach the senior college in a similar manner, with whom Mental health volunteers training along with teachers was launched last year which was interrupted due to pandemic. Project is in its active planning and programming stage and the end result and analysis is to be followed soon.

## CAREER GUIDANCE SESSION -

In order to help the exiting final year residents to plan their career, MLDMHI had organised an online CAREER GUIDING SESSION for its MD II residents on 17<sup>th</sup> December 2020. Dr Sachin Junagade under the guidance of Dr Anoop Nigvekar, HOD Repertory, coordinated the event. Final year residents benefited in choosing a path for their future.

## “UDAAN 2020” A Farewell function for the batch 2017-20

Every year middle batch residents of MLDMHI organizes a farewell function for its exiting residents. It is an important event with mixed emotions for exiting batch residents. After completing their three years residential PG course they are about to fly high in the world of Homoeopathy carrying tons of memories of past three years.
